

3.1 Battery

3.1.1 Battery charging

1. Use a battery charging dock to charge the battery by connecting to a USB Type-C cable and power adaptor.

2. Or charge the battery from the USB interface of the thermal camera when it is plugged in.

The LED indicator lamp on the front view of thermal imager:

3.1.2 Low battery warning

- 1. If the thermal camera's battery level is below 20% when turned on, the battery-warning window will pop up.
- If the thermal camera's battery level is below 20% during operation, the battery-warning window will pop up; If the operation continues, the battery-warning window will pop up again when the battery level is below 10%.
- If the thermal camera's battery level is below 20% during use, the battery-warning window will pop up; if plugged in the power charging adaptor, the battery warning window will disappear.

3.1.3 Plugging out the battery when the camera is charging

- 1. When the camera is turned off, and no battery inside:
- If connected to a power adaptor or computer via USB cable, the camera will not be turned on.

- 2. When the camera is turned on, and the battery is inside;
- If the battery is taken out when the camera is being charged, a prompt window will pop up: "Battery not detected, auto shutdown in 10 seconds", and it will start a 10-second countdown.
- If the battery is plugged in within 10 seconds, the camera will not shutdown

3.1.4 USB interface functions


The thermal camera's USB Type-C interface to support 3 functions:

- Support MTP connection to computers, for reading and quickly transfer data from the TF card.
- Support real-time communication with PC and camera, for full-radiation video streaming and analysis. When the camera is video streaming via USB, the camera will not respond to touch-screen or panel operations.
- Support battery charging in the camera. When the camera is turned off with the battery in, the USB cable still supplies power, but not data transfer or video streaming.

3.1.5 Screen-off settings

- When the screen is on, it supports manual screen-off, auto screen-off with timer, and never screen-off options.
- When the screen is on, press the power button to turn off the screen manually.
- When the screen is off press the power button to wake up the screen.
- In Auto screen-off mode, the camera can automatically turn off the screen after a certain time of non-operation, such as 5, 10, 30 minutes, or never off. After selecting the 'Never' screen off option, users can only use the power button to turn the screen off and on.
- when the screen is off, plugging in the USB cable to a computer or a power adaptor will wake up the screen.

3.2 Turning on and off the thermal camera



To turn on the thermal imager, long-press the Power Button

To power off or restart the thermal imager, long-press the Power Button (for about 5 seconds), and select "Power-off" or "Reboot" from the pop-up window.

3.3 Adjusting the Infrared Lens Manually

Operation Figure



- For far focus, rotate the focus ring clockwise (from the perspective where the LCD screen is facing towards the user).
- For near focus, rotate the focus ring counterclockwise (from the perspective where the LCD screen is facing towards the user).

Note: For camera with 49°lens configuration, users may hear a click when rotating the ring. It means the camera is now optimized to focus on objects that are farther than 0.5 meters.

3.4 Copying the TF card's data to computer Via card reader.

Operation procedures

After capturing photos and videos, the files are saved in the TF card.

The image and video files can be copied to a computer via TF card and TF card reader.

- Pull out the TF card in the thermal imager
- Insert the TF card into a card reader, and insert the card reader into a computer's USB port
- In the file explorer, open the '/Gallery' file of the TF card disk, and copy desired files to the computer
- Import the data to the PC software for further analysis and reporting

3.5 Copying the TF card's data to computer Via USB cable.


After capturing images or videos, the files are stored in the TF card.

The image and video files can be copied to a computer from the TF card, via USB cable.

Operation procedures

- 1. Open the lid on the top of the thermal camera, and find the USB Type-C interface.
- 2. Use a USB- Type-C to USB cable to connect the thermal imager to a computer.
- 3. Turn on the thermal imager.
- 4. In the file explorer, open the '/Gallery' file of the camera disk, and copy desired files to the computer.
- 5. Import the data to the PC software for further analysis and reporting.


3.6 The laser pointer



When turned on, a laser dot is projected onto the target object.

- 1. To turn on the laser, press the laser button 💽
- 2. When the laser is activated, there will be a visible "A " symbol on the top-right corner of the screen and the laser dot will be approximately on the center of the screen.
- 3. To turn off the laser, release the laser button 💽.

3.7 AI programmable key



The AI programmable key can call upon different functions according to the user's need. It is available on the main interface, image freeze interface, and gallery's image analysis interface.

Long press on the 'AI' key (>2s) to enter the AI programmable interface, to link different functions onto the button.


Press the 'OK' button to finalize the option, and press the 'Return' button to abort the selection process.

Tap on the 'AI' key to activate the linked function.



3.8 Gallery



Press the 'Gallery' button () ' to access the gallery, like the image shown below. For more detailed instructions, please refer to chapter 7 on the menu.



3.9 Non-Uniform-Calibration(NUC)

When it shows "calibration..." on the top of the screen, 'Non-Uniform-Calibration' (NUC) is active.


NUC activates automatically, when the device is starting, changing measurement range, and every few minutes to account for the environmental thermal noise.

Manually operate NUC

Users can manually operate NUC, by long-press the 'gallery' button for more than 2 seconds

Main Interface

4.1 Overview



1. Status bar

On the right top corner is the status bar. It contains status information about: battery, TF card low storage room alarm, Wi-Fi, Wi-Fi hotspot, geographical location, and laser-on indicator.

Introduction:

- Battery icon: indication of battery's power level and charging status.
- TF card low storage room alarm: when the TF card's storage room is lower than 100MB, it will be displayed.
- Laser-on indicator: when the laser is activated, the icon will be displayed.
- Wi-Fi icon: When the Wi-Fi is on and properly connected, the icon will appear.
- Bluetooth icon: when Bluetooth is activated and connected, the icon will be displayed.
- Geographical location icon: When the GPS is turned on, the icon will be displayed.

2. Measurement results

On the left top part of the screen is the measurement results

- It can display the maximum, minimum, and average temperature on the screen and overall emissivity.
- It can display the ROI's maximum, minimum, and average temperature, and ROI emissivity. For specific instructions, refer to section 4.8.6.

3. Palette and temperature scale display

On the right side is the temperature scale displays: currently used palette color, the upper and lower limits of the temperature scale, temperature span. For specific instructions, please refer to Section 4.5 Temperature Scale Mode and 4.10 Palette.

4. LOGO & System Date/Time

On the left bottom side of the screen are the brand logo and system time. The time display is refined to seconds.

5. Image Display

Displays: Thermal, Digital camera, Picture in Picture, Thermal & Visual light digital camera Image Fusion, and measurement tools. For specific instructions, please refer to Section 4.7 Image Mode

6. System menu

On the bottom of the screen **even** is the system menu button. For specific instructions, please refer to section 4.4

7. Measurement parameter

On the bottom-right corner of the screen are the

measurement parameters: emissivity, reflected temperature, environment temperature, humidity, and measuring distance. For specific instructions, please refer to section 4.6 'Measurement Parameters Settings'.



4.2 Swipe-down menu

This menu can be displayed by swiping from up to down on the screen.

The menu contains system functions like WLAN, flashlight, hide overlays, SR (super resolution), volume, and brightness.

- 1. To open: Swipe down from the top of the screen.
- 2. Button control can be set by click.

3. To close: Swipe up from the bottom, or click any button on the operation panel.


Hide All Overlays

Image overlay information includes measurement result table, temperature, measurement parameters, ROI settings, and system menu button.

Overlay information can be Hide by the "Hide" function in the swipe-down menu.

When the 'Hide' function is activated, users can not enter the main menu, but can still get access to functions like gallery browsing, focusing, and taking images.

As shown below:



4.3 Digital zoom of real-time imaging

The Real-time thermal image and video can be scaled using the 'digital zoom' function of the thermal imager.

The digital zoom function is only available in thermal image mode.

Operating Procedures:

- Zoom in: Touch the screen with two fingers and spread the fingers apart.
- Zoom out: Touch the screen with two fingers and pinch the fingers together.

Use of digital zoom:

- Capture image: zoomed photo will serve as cover view, but all the raw data in the original image will be kept.
- Freeze image: Not support digital zoom
- Gallery image: Support digital zoom
- 1. Hide the adjusting scroll:

Pressing the 'OK' or 'return' button. When magnification is greater than 1.0, it will display the zoomed value; when

magnification is 1.0, it will hide the zoomed value;

2. The magnifying capability is determined by the device model. The minimal magnification increment is 0.1.

4.4 System menu



Click System Menu button •••• to set:



- 1. Temperature scale mode: auto-scale, manual scale, touch scale.
- 2. Im Measurement parameters: emissivity, reflection temperature, ambient temperature, relative humidity, temperature measurement distance, IR window compensation.
- 3. Image mode: thermal image, digital camera image, picture-in-picture, thermal& digital image fusion mode settings.
- 4. ROI temperature measurement tools: points, rectangles, circles, lines, etc., settings for sound alarm, temperature rise, delete, display settings for temperature measurement masks.
- 5. Delette: Iron, Grey, Rainbow, Rain, Medical, GreyRed, etc.
- 6. O Settings: capture mode, Connection, temperature measurement range, storage and save options, device set.

4.5 Temperature scale mode



4.5.1 Auto Scale Mode

In Auto Scale Mode, the upper and lower temperature scale limits are

automatically adjusted to achieve the best image color display effect according to the histogram of overall temperature distribution. On the right side of the screen, it displays the temperature scale with the max and min temperature values, which are also calculated according to the distribution.

4.5.2 Manual Scale Mode

In Manual Scale Mode, the upper and lower limits of temperature scale limits can be set manually. The manual scale has two span options, which can be set in "Settings-Device Set- Manual Mode".



4.5.2.1 Max / Min Mode

In Maximum/Minimum mode, the upper and lower limits of the temperature scale can be adjusted.

1. After selecting the Max/Min manual temperature scale mode, the upper and lower limits of the temperature scale can be selected. And the grey icon represents the selected state.



2. The upper and lower limits of the temperature scale in the selected state can be adjusted by using the slider or pressing the up and down direction keys.

As shown in the figure below, the upper and lower limits of the temperature scale

can be adjusted at the same time by using the slider:



As shown in the figure below, the lower limit of the temperature scale can be adjusted separately by using the slider



As shown in the figure below, the upper limit of the temperature scale can be adjusted separately by using the slider:




As shown in the figure below, both upper and lower limits of the temperature scale are locked and cannot be adjusted:



Users can adjust the upper or lower limit by pressing the left and right direction keys. The selected limit is displayed in gray.

As shown in the image below, the upper limit is selected.

And the upper limit of temperature scale can be adjusted by up and down direction key.



As shown in the image below, the lower limit is selected. And the lower limit of the temperature scale can be adjusted by up and down direction key



As shown in the image below, the upper and lower limits are selected. And the range of temperature scale can be

adjusted by up and down direction key



A short press on the direction key will increment the span by 0.1 degree. When held on, the increment will gradually increase

4.5.2.2 Temperature span mode

In temperature span mode, the temperature span (difference between upper and lower limits) value can be adjusted independently.

The upper and lower limits of the temperature scale can only be adjusted at the same time, not separately. As shown below:



- Scroll or press the up/down direction key to simultaneously adjust temperature upper and lower limit
- Temperature scale span can be adjusted by pressing the left/right direction key

4.5.1 Touch scale mode

In Touch scale mode, the upper and lower temperature scale limits

can be adjusted automatically by touching the screen based on temperature range of the touch area (about 10 x 10 pixels in size). Touch scale mode has two options just like manual scale mode.

1. In Maximum/Minimum value mode, the temperature

scale can be adjusted by selecting the upper and lower limits of the temperature scale. (If the gray base is selected, refer to manual mode).

 In Temperature span mode, the upper and lower limits of the temperature scale can only be adjusted at the same time, not separately. Press the left and right direction keys to adjust the temperature scale range.

Note: Aside from touching the screen, the scale can also be changed by pressing buttons and scrolling on the screen. For more specific instructions, please see the manual scale mode.


4.6 Measurement parameter settings

is the measurement parameter menu button, which can be used to adjust the temperature parameters of the thermal imager. For accurate measurement, it is important to set the measurement parameters.

The adjusted parameters are saved and loaded in the system, whenever the device reboots. If you need to reset the temperature measurement parameters, you can refer to the "recommended values" or reset to the factory defaults.

Note: There is usually no need to change the default measurement parameters. Please make

necessary adjustments according to practical needs. The parameters will directly affect temperature measurement results.



4.6.1 Setting Emissivity

Emissivity is the ratio of an object's outward radiation energy compared to a black body's, at the same temperature and wavelength. The value is between 0 and 1.0.

Note: Emissivity is one of the most important parameters for accurate temperature measurement



E The emissivity settings of the FOTRIC thermal imager have 2 options: Full screen emissivity correction and partial emissivity correction.

To set full-screen emissivity, please perform the following procedures:

- 1. Click the emissivity set button.
- 2. Slide up and down to set the emissivity value (0.01 1.0), or choose the material type.
- 3. If the type of the material is not found on the table, please refer to the material emissivity Table at the end of this manual. If the material type is not in the material emissivity table or unknown, please contact Fotric for professional support.


4. Click on other areas of the thermal image screen, or click the back button to complete the setting.

Note: For partial emissivity, please refer to ROI partial emissivity setting.

4.6.2 Setting Reflected Temperature

The reflected temperature set compensates for the radiation from the surroundings reflected by the measured object. Range:(-40 to700 Celsius)

If the target's emissivity is low and the ambient temperature is much lower than the target's reflected light source, it becomes important to correctly set this parameter for accurate temperature measurement.




To set the reflected temperature, please follow the following procedures:

- 1. Measure the actual temperature of the reflection source near the target with a thermal imager.
- 2. Click the reflected temperature set button.
- 3. Slide up and down to set the reflection temperature value as the result measured by the thermal imager.
- 4. Click on other areas of the thermal image screen, or click the back button to complete the settings.

Note: Try to avoid reflection interference if possible. It can greatly improve measurement accuracy

4.6.3 Setting Ambient Temperature

Ambient temperature is the air temperature between the measured object and the Lens of the thermal imager. Available setting range: -20~70 Celsius.



To set the ambient temperature, please perform the following procedures:

- 1. Click the ambient temperature set button.
- 2. Slide up and down to set the ambient temperature value.
- 3. Click on other areas of the thermal image screen, or click the back button to complete the setting.

Note: The ambient temperature value is set by default in the system. This parameter should be set only if the ambient temperature is higher than that of the measured object.

4.6.4 Setting Relative humidity

Relative humidity is used to compensate for the thermal radiation absorbed by atmosphere moisture between the measured object and the lens of the thermal imager. Therefore, when the measured target is far, it is important to set the appropriate value for this parameter.



To set the relative humidity, please perform the following procedures:

- 1. Click the relative humidity set button.
- 2. Slide up and down to set the relative humidity value.
- 3. Click on other areas of the thermal image screen, or click


the back button to complete setting.

Note: For short distances and under normal humidity conditions, the default RH value of the thermal imager is usually okay.

4.6.5 Setting Measurement Distance

Measurement distance is the distance between the measured object and the lens of the thermal imager. The value is between $0.5 \sim 100$ meters. This parameter is used to compensate for the following two elements:

- The thermal radiation, which the atmosphere air absorb between the objectand the thermal imager lens.
- The thermal radiation from the atmosphere air itself.



To set the measurement distance, please perform the following procedures:

- 1. Click the measure distance set button.
- 2. According to the actual distance between the measured target and the infrared thermal imager lens, slide the distance value on the screen up and down, and set the distance value to the actual value.
- 3. Click on other areas of the thermal image screen, or click the back button to complete the setting.

4.6.6 Setting IR Window Compensation

IR window compensation compensates for the transmittance and temperature of the external optics between the measured object and the lens of the thermal imager. External optics' temperature range: (-40-700 Celsius); Transmittance range:(0.01-1.00).



O To set the IR window compensation, please perform the following procedures:

- Measure the actual transmittance of the external lens or external infrared window (usually tested by the FOTRIC after-sales service department or by a qualified partner licensed, with standard measurement master for precise test).
- 2. Click the IR window compensation set button.
- 3. Slide up and down to select the temperature of the external optical window/lens.
- 4. Slide up and down (0.01 1.0) and set the transmittance value.
- Click on other areas of the thermal image screen, or click the back button to complete IR window compensation setting.

Note: If the selected external optical lens has been calibrated at the factory, or there is no external infrared window, the IR window compensation is usually set to off.

This is the icon for sound alarm.

Alarm off: no alarm icon on the screen.

- The alarm is activated but not triggered: the alarm icon is a static and white; The temperature values are white; No alarm sound.
- High-temperature alarm: When the detected temperature is higher than the preset high-temperature threshold, the temperature value will turn red, and the camera will let out a series of sharp rapid beep.
- Low-temperature alarm: When the detected temperature is lower than the preset low-temperature threshold, the temperature value will turn blue, and the camera will let out a series of sharp and intermittent beep.

5.3 Time-lapse mode

- Users can set intervals between taken photos, shortest being 2 seconds and longest being 60 minutes 59 seconds.
- 2. Users can also set the Stop time, after a certain number of pictures have been taken. The maximum set number being 1000; or unlimited.





TWB mode: TWB is named Thermal White Balance. It balances color distribution on the entire temperature span of the image.

When the TWB function is turned on, the overall image color display will be balanced non-linearly according to the histogram of overall temperature.


It makes the extreme hot/cold area's color display weaken, while other areas are enhanced with more gradients.

8.2 Cleaning lenses

8.2.1 Fluid

Please apply the following fluid

- 1. Commercial lens liquid cleanser containing at least 30% isopropanol.
- 2. 96% alcohol liquid.

8.2.2 Cleaning procedures

Please perform the follow the instructions below:

- 1. Dip medical cotton in alcohol.
- 2. Wipe the lenses with soaked medical cotton.

!Caution:

- 1. Medical cotton is a disposable item. Please don't use it repeatedly.
- 2. Clean carefully. The lenses are coated with a delicate anti-reflection layer.

3. To avoid damaging the layer, please don't apply excessive force.

8.3 Lithium battery maintenance

- 1. Please do not leave the batteries near a heat source or fire. Avoid direct sunlight.
- 2. Please don't disassembly or squish the batteries.
- If the product is not going to be used for a long time, please take out the battery to prevent possible leakage from the battery damaging the product.
- 4. Please only use the FOTRIC-authorized power adaptor and charger to charge the batteries.
- 5. Please keep the batteries in a clean and dry environment.

Note: to avoid accidents, please do not expose the batteries to a heat source or in a high-temperature environment (ex. In unmonitored cars parked under direct sunlight)

Vocabulary

Absolute zero

Absolute zero refers to the temperature of -273.15 °C (0 Kelvin = -459.69 °F). Absolute zero is an ideal state, in which all material's atomic movement completely stopped. At this temperature, objects have no thermal energy.

Kelvin [K]

Kelvin is a general temperature unit; an Object of 0 K temperature reaches absolute zero (-273.15°C).

 $273.15 \text{ K} = 0^{\circ}\text{C} = 32^{\circ}\text{F} \circ \text{K} = ^{\circ}\text{C} + 273.15^{\circ}$

Celsius [°C]

Celsius is a temperature unit that is widely accepted globally. Under standard atmospheric pressure, water's boiling temperature is defined 100 $^\circ\!C$, and its melting point is defined 0 $^\circ\!C$.

 $^{\circ}C$ = ($^{\circ}F$ -32)/1.8 or $^{\circ}C$ = K-273.15

Fahrenheit [T]

Fahrenheit is a temperature unit that is widely accepted in

North America.

 $^{\circ}F = (^{\circ}C \times 1.8) + 32.$

Infrared radiation

Infrared radiation is a form of electromagnetic radiation. Any object with a temperature above absolute zero emits infrared radiation.

Absorptivity

Any object can absorb infrared radiation, and the direct result of infrared absorption is temperature rise. Objects with a higher temperature usually emit more energy than objects with a lower temperature. Infrared radiation an object absorbs is usually transformed into thermal energy of its own and gets re-emitted. Therefore, an object's emissivity is linked to its absorptivity.

Radiation

Any object with a temperature higher than absolute zero is continuously radiating heat in the form of an electromagnetic wave. The capacity of emitting energy is called emissivity.

Conduction

Heat is always transferring from objects with higher temperatures to objects with lower temperatures. Conduction

is the primary way of heat transfer in solids.

Convection

The process of transferring heat due to the movement of fluid is called convection and is usually caused by an imbalance of temperature.

Atmospheric windows

A range of wavelengths over which there is relatively little absorption of radiation by atmospheric gases is called 'atmospheric window'. The atmospheric window of the infrared band locates between $7 \sim 14 \mu$ m, where the atmospheric transmittance is most stable. Therefore, thermal measurement on this window is particularly accurate.

Blackbody radiator

Black body radiator refers to objects that absorb all incident radiation and convert them into their energy to emit outwards, during which process there is no occurrence of either reflection or transmission. A blackbody's emissivity ϵ = 1. A blackbody is an ideal object that does not exist in the real world. Blackbodies used for research and calibration are close approximations with emissivity close to 1 (usually greater than 0.95).

Colored body radiator

A colored body radiator refers to materials whose emissivity changes based on wavelength and temperature difference. An object could have a few different emissivities. Most metals are colored body radiators. (Ex: Aluminum's emissivity rises when heated).

Thermal Imager

Thermal imager refers to devices that can detect radiations of infrared-band wavelength and convert the invisible infrared radiation into visible pictures. Thermal imagers are widely used for temperature measurement and infrared thermal imaging.

IR Detector

An infrared thermal imager's detector can detect thermal radiation and transform it into an electrical signal. The minimum unit of a detector is called 'pixel'.

Uncooled Infrared Focal Plane Array (FPA)

In the earlier stage of development, FPA detectors require cryogenic cooling, and their sizes are massive; Nowadays, FPA detectors don't necessarily require cooling and can take on high accuracy measurements. There are two types of FPA sensors: optical readout uncooled focal plane array and electrical readout uncooled focal plane array.

Frame Rate

The unit for frame rate is 'Hertz'. It refers to frequency image refreshes on the thermal imager. Ex: if a thermal imager's refreshing rate is 30 Hz. It means the imager will update 30 complete thermal images in one second.

Resolution

Resolution is a parameter for measuring the amount of data in an image. It refers to the number of pixels in a unit length.

Lens

The lens determines the thermal imager's range of field view. A wide-angle lens can measure the temperature distribution of a larger field, and a telephoto lens can observe finer detail in distance. Germanium, silicon, and zinc selenide are good materials for making camera lenses because they have high infrared transmittance.

Field of View (FOV)

Field of view refers to the vertical and horizontal angle objects project themselves in the thermal imager.

MFOV

The MFOV is the minimum pixel range in which a thermal

detector can accurately measure temperature. There are two types: MFOV=1, and MFOV= $3 \times 3 = 9$.

Thermal Image

Thermal Image displays surface temperature distribution of an object.

By receiving the object's radiation energy, the thermal imager converts pixels' temperature values into visible colors on the matrix coordinates. Each pixel represents a temperature measuring point on the object's surface.

Measurement Range

Measurement Range refers to the temperature range that a thermal imager can accurately measure and record. Outside of the measuring range, the device will neither be able to properly display the information nor guarantee the accuracy of the measurement.

NETD

NETD stands for sensitivity (also known as Noise Equivalent Temperature Difference). It describes the minimal temperature difference the thermal imager can detect. The smaller the NETD, the more sensitive the thermal imager, and the image will be clearer.

Accuracy

It refers to how close the measured result is to the reference. Ex: if the actual temperature of an object surface is 100 °C , and the accuracy is ± 2 °C , then the measured temperature would be 98 °C —102 °C .

Verification

Verification is a process, which compares the measurement result and the object's standard value. Verification is not calibration; Verification records the deviation while calibration corrects the result.

Color Palette

Color Palette determines how an image's color is displayed. Based on different measurement assignments, the thermal imaging display uses different color contrast.

Color Isotherms

This function marks every point of the same temperature with the same color in a certain range. It aids real-time analysis.

Cold spot and Hot spot

The point with the highest temperature in a certain region is called a 'hot spot'. Conversely, the point with the lowest temperature in a certain region is called a 'cold spot'.

Emissivity (ε)

Emissivity is a measure of how much radiation is emitted from the object, compared to that from a perfect blackbody of the same temperature. Emissivity is a physical property of a measured object, which determines by its surface characteristics, temperature, and wavelength.

RTC

RTC stands for Reflected Temperature Compensation. Some objects have high reflectivity, which could induce false readings from reflecting thermal radiation of higher temperature objects nearby. In short, when the observed object has relatively low emissivity, and there are heat sources nearby, it's a good idea to turn on RTC.

Condensation

It refers to the process of gas turning liquid. When an object's surface temperature is lower than the ambient temperature, the moisture in the air will condense into water droplets on the surface.

Dew point

When the temperature reaches a certain point, the unsaturated water vapor in the air will become 100% saturated. The temperature point is called the dew point.

Relative humidity

It is the percentage of absolute humidity of air at a certain temperature, and saturated vapor pressure of water at the same temperature.

Specular reflection

Specular reflection usually occurs on an object surface of high reflectivity or low emissivity. However, the occurrence of specular reflection does not guarantee high reflectivity.

Reflectance (p)

It refers to an object's ability to reflect radiant energy. It depends on the material's type, surface characteristics, temperature, and incident wavelength. Generally speaking, smooth and polished surfaces have larger reflectance.

Transmittance (τ)

It refers to a material's ability to transmit radiation. It depends on the material's type and thickness.

Heat Transfer Coefficient

It reflects an object's ability to convey heat by convection. Definition: when the temperature difference between fluid and solid surface is 1 k, the amount of energy been conveyed by convection of 1 unit area in a second.

Kirchhoff's radiation law

Kirchhoff's radiation law describes the relationship between an object's emissivity and absorptivity of a certain wavelength: at thermal equilibrium, an object's absorptivity of thermal radiation is equal to its emissivity at the same temperature.

Planck's radiation law

Planck's radiation law indicates that energy emitted by a blackbody is dependent on the frequency of the radiation. E=hf, 'h' being the Planck's constant and 'f' being the frequency of the radiation.

Stefan-Boltzmann-law

The Stefan-Boltzmann law indicates the total power emitted by a blackbody is proportional to its temperature's fourth power. $Wb=\sigma \cdot e \cdot T^4$.
